Dr. Mary Stapel, a physician in Peoria who teaches Global Health at the University of Illinois Medical School, discussed the current "Global Health and Trends in Global Health Education." She feels the best definition of global health as summarized by Keith Martin and Richard Horton is "to improve the well-being of people and the planet where we can."

Global health does not just relate to people in areas like Africa and Southeast Asia, but rural areas of the US along with the homeless and poor in US cities. Human trafficking as well ties into global health. Dr. Stapel also shared about her medical mission trips she took to Haiti and Ghana.

Vice-President Nancy Wier (Eureka) read an invitation from Suzy Perkins of Beta Chapter to attend their January 16th meeting and hear a speaker discuss bullying in the Bloomington and Normal schools.
