## Alpha Beta Members Share in Discussion of *Mrs. Lincoln's Dressmaker*Carol Hughes

On January 7 the Alpha Beta Chapter of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International met at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Pontiac. Jari Lynn Oncken (Minonk) led the discussion of the book *Mrs. Lincoln's Dressmaker* by Jennifer Chiaverini. Mary Todd Lincoln's dressmaker was Elizabeth Keckley, who first started designing and sewing dresses for Mrs. Lincoln shortly after her husband became the 16<sup>th</sup> president. Born into slavery, Elizabeth managed to purchase the freedom of herself and her son before the Civil War began.

She maintained a friendship for many years after Lincoln's assassination with Mary who had faced many tragedies in her own life in Washington and afterward. Chiaverini's book further sheds light on Lincoln as a political leader, husband, father, and friend to Elizabeth. Keckley also wrote a book, *Behind the Scenes*, about her life as a slave, as Mrs. Lincoln's dressmaker, and as a woman who helped slaves after they were freed.

President Barb Baumann (Minonk) passed out directions on logging in to the DKG website so that members will be able to download a variety of forms and take part in networking.

Treasurer Janet Kilgus reported that the contributions for local, state and international projects have all been sent. Carol Hughes (Roanoke) noted that the chapter is very generous in its contributions in comparison with many of the chapters in Illinois.

Membership Chair Louann Harms (Fairbury) asked members to distribute the applications for \$100 grants to early career educators in schools in their areas. She passed out cards to fill in with the names of prospective members. Lou Ann Jacobs (Normal), explained a section of SB 2912 which reduces substitute teaching license fees from \$100 to \$50 and allows educators licensed in other states to obtain an Illinois license through a more streamlined process.
